Titoki Nursery is a native plant nursery specialising in revegetation projects throughout Tasman & Nelson for 25 years. As such we grow plants for conservation, river stabilisation and farm shelter, land development, and the rehabilitation of mined sites. Other sites include parks and scenic reserves, beaches, highway berms, indigenous forestry trials, wetlands and effluent treatment ponds.

Our plants are largely grown in containers called 'rootainers' designed especially for large scale production. The unique design of the rootainer ensures excellent plant form and root structure. Survival rates after planting are consistently high. Seed is collected throughout the Tasman and Nelson districts, or beyond for specific projects, and the sources are fully recorded. This information can be useful if planting in or near protected areas.

We offer advice, and can prepare revegetation plans or plant schedules for your site or project. Species not listed in the current year's catalogue can be grown to order with one to two years notice required to source and propagate seed, and any wish lists are welcomed!

Titoki Nursery is situated near Brightwater and you are welcome to visit and inspect our revegetation plants, view the wide range of species available in potted/landscape grades, or to discuss your needs. The nursery is open from 8.30am – 4.30 pm Monday to Friday.

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SUGGESTIONS FOR PLANTING

We offer advice for landowners who wish to restore important remaining forest remnants, fence off wetlands on farms, or create shelter or stream buffers using native species. We are also involved with several rare/threatened local plant projects each year. Often plants become threatened through isolation, habitat degradation, or browsing, and while many may be easy to propagate finding suitable safe sites to re-introduce them is often more challenging. Therefore we work closely with the Tasman Environmental Trust, QEII National Trust and the Department of Conservation, for whom we grow plants and are a registered seed collector of Conservation Estates.

COASTAL SITES

Counter erosion, stabilise and build beaches with sand binding species *Spinifex sericeus*, *Desmoschoenus spiralis* (pingao) and sand tussock (*Poa billardierei*). These species can protect against sea-level rises and storm events by trapping and growing with moving sands. Back-dune plant communities comprise *Muehlenbeckia complexa* and sand *Coprosma*, toetoe, ngaio, akeake and akiraho.

For beach owners in the Marlborough Sounds or on the coastline of Tasman or Golden Bays, native plants will provide good shelter from the wind. For sites surrounded by gorse or scrub some native plants will also reduce the risk of fire. On very exposed sites plant ngaio, mirror leaved *Coprosma*, toetoe and flax as the first line of defence and behind these a mixture of akeake, kohuhu, kanuka, and koromiko.

For landowners around coastal estuaries, plant communities include salt-marsh ribbonwood, mingimingi, toetoe, harakeke, and cabbage tree. Rushes - wiwi and oi oi, and estuarine tussock.

WETLANDS, RIVERBANKS AND PONDS

Land owner's with rivers/streams/ditches running through their properties can aid water quality and habitat by excluding stock. Fences should be 'ideally' set back at least 5m to create enough shade to keep weeds at bay. Planting riparian species will stabilise the banks, filter and shade runoff, and reduce bacteria levels significantly. With stock access denied river banks will not be broken down and eroded, requiring less clearing.

Native plants suitable for such sites include *Carex secta/virgata* (sedges), harakeke, cabbage tree and toetoe. Beyond these species on higher ground, - plant karamu, kohuhu, lemonwood, lacebark and ribbonwood.

Wetland species tolerant of permanent submergence include raupo and *Baumea articulata* near the edges and lake club rush deeper still, acting as filters for water treatment.

For projects where primary cover has been established it is important to introduce climactic forest species for the future such as kahikatea, totara, beech, and rimu.

LOWLAND FOREST

Land owner's who wish to create a small area of bush, are best to plant quick growing natives initially to compete with the many light demanding weeds such as gorse and rank grass species. Once plant leaves meet (canopy closure) the resulting shade will diminish weed control requirements, however until this time it bears immense effect on results and growth rates.

Plant kohuhu, shining karamu/karamu, lemonwood, koromiko, cabbage tree, narrow-leaved lacebark, and kanuka. On warmer free draining sites include akeake, akiraho and ngaio.

If you already have a patch of bush, plant up the gaps and edges to discourage weeds and include putaputaweta, mahoe, five-finger or pigeonwood, all tolerant of more shady sites and margins.

NATIVE BIRDS

All native plantings will create a good habitat for birds providing nectar, fruits or seeds.

For nectar, plant flax, *Pittosporum*, cabbage tree, and kowhai, while fruiting species include *Coprosma*, wineberry, kahikatea, totara and matai.
